POSITIONS

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INTRODUCTION

The 2016-2019 three-year term has been characterised by intense activity, with the Board of the Foundation working hard and with great professionalism to achieve significant results in the long process of pursuing full promotion of the Country's Jewish cultural heritage.

Particularly of note is the important progress made by the Foundation in engaging with the international community, achieved by establishing links with prestigious Foundations abroad and the launch of an English-language website dedicated to presenting the Jewish cultural heritage of the various regions.

Great strides have been made in the lengthy process of cataloguing the heritage, something that has taken years to complete. The work is being carried out by six young cataloguers, supervised by a qualified Scientific Committee. It has been facilitated by the purchase of dedicated software, which will result in all the files soon being available on the Foundation portal.

As regards restoring heritage works, of particular note is the great work carried out to better conserve and fully avail of two extraordinary cultural assets: the old cemetery of the Jewish community of Gorizia in Valdirose, and the Jewish catacombs of Venosa.

Significant developments have also taken place in the library context, thanks to a project that saw the fruitful collaboration between the UCEI, the Foundation and CDEC, with the support of the *Rothschild Foundation (Hanadiv) Europe.* This initiative involved the cataloguing of books from certain Jewish Communities, in preparation for a training programme for the Community's librarians.

The three-year period also saw the organisation of two notable exhibitions. The first, at the National Library of Florence in 2016, saw volumes damaged in the 1966 flood on display. The second, in the Uffizi Gallery in 2019, focused on Jewish textiles, and involved a collaboration between the Gallery and the Jewish Museum of Rome.

Both events introduced the wealth and wonder of Jewish cultural heritage to a very wide audience. December 2017, meanwhile, saw the opening of the National Museum of Italian Judaism and the Shoah (MEIS) in Ferrara, with two splendid exhibitions on the first thousand years of Jewish presence in Italy and the contribution of Jewish culture to Italian Renaissance art and culture.

The Foundation also funded research activities, by awarding grants to young scholars, facilitating the emergence of new scientific knowledge and culminating in publications in specialist magazines or dedicated volumes.

The Foundation also supported various research events and conferences on Jewish cultural heritage, while the Chair, Vice Chairs and members of the Board regularly contributed to training courses and



conferences, giving talks on the status of Jewish cultural heritage, in which there is increasing interest.

Finally, the <u>www.jewishitaly.it</u> website was launched to promote and increase engagement. It is the result of the overhaul of the "*Luoghi Imperdibili*" [*Unmissable Sites*] section of the Foundation portal, intended to provide visitors from all over the world with essential information for planning trips to explore Italian Jewish culture and heritage.

To conclude, the three-year period has seen significant strides being made towards achieving the institutional objectives of the Foundation, which the incoming Board will be required to further implement.



CATALOGUING THE HERITAGE

Accurate and up-to-date cataloguing of the cultural heritage represents a first, indispensable step towards allowing the Community, Foundations and Museums to work to protect and promote the Country's Jewish cultural assets.

In pursuit of this objective, the Board, during its previous mandate, established an intensive collaboration with the Italian Central Institute for Cataloguing and Documentation (ICCD) at MiBAC. This has enabled training to be provided to the experts employed by the Foundation, to update and enter data into the SIGEC information system. The objective of this process is to build a database in that system that can be consulted online, and a thematic itinerary dedicated to Jewish cultural assets.

Of particular importance in this regard was the signing, in 2015, of an Agreement with ICCD (www.iccd.beniculturali.it/index.php?it/516/convenzioni/convenzioni_557ffbc705f26/71) that, thanks to the dedicated software purchased by the Foundation from a Company specialised in IT programmes for cultural heritage applications, will enable the files relating to all catalogued assets to be made available to scholars and all other interested parties via the FBCEI portal.

Another significant event was the agreement reached with MEIS that will see the Jewish Cultural Heritage Catalogue Centre being located within the Museum in Ferrara.

The call for applications, launched in Autumn 2016 to recruit six cataloguers to record and work with the assets of the various Regions – overseen by supervisors and coordinated by a Scientific Committee – received responses from more than 400 candidates, many of an extremely high standard. This testifies to the great interest in Jewish cultural heritage among young researchers.


The successful candidates, from 2016 to date, attended a specific training course on the cataloguing system adopted by the Ministry before being tasked with updating the information contained in certain batches of files (approximately 1,500).

They have also trialled a new text-input module for ICCD, that allows non-Latin characters to be entered without requiring transliteration, an important innovation for cataloguing assets featuring Hebrew writing.

The acquisition, in 2019, of software for the ABACVM IT platform therefore enables an important objective to be achieved, making a portal containing all artefact files available to scholars and interested parties.



The Foundation expresses its gratitude to the members of the Scientific Committee – Dora Liscia Bemporad, Mauro Perani, Andreina Draghi and Renata Segre – and to the cataloguers – Baruch Lampronti, Liora Reif, Davide Spagnoletto, Antonio Giulio Spagnuolo and Roberta Tonnarelli – for the results achieved.





RESTORATION WORKS

RESTORATION AND PROMOTION OF THE OLD CEMETERY IN GORIZIA

A productive first meeting in January 2016 with the Mayor of Nova Gorica and the Mayor of Gorizia, and the subsequent inspection of the Jewish Cemetery of Valdirose, resulted in a restoration and promotion plan being drawn up. On the one hand, the project aims to enable this extraordinary historical and architectural heritage to be rediscovered by the international community and, on the other, enable the "two Gorizias", previously separated by political and ethnic rifts, to join together to reclaim its Memory in the name of Jewish Gorizia.

An important cross-border project, then, that could see the collaboration of Local Administrative Bodies, Organisations for Economic, Cultural and Tourism Cooperation. It will be fundamental to the success of the project to identify European funding channels, as well as national and regional financing.

The plan involves turning the first floor of the former funeral temple into an exhibition and information centre (panels + computerised displays) on the history of the Jewish cemetery, its community and the famous people buried there, who include the rabbi Isaac Samuele Reggio, the journalist and patriot Carolina Luzzatto, the renowned philosopher Carlo Michelstaedter and the first rector of the University of Trieste Giulio Morpurgo.

Archival research aims to gather indirect sources with links to the history of the site, from its establishment and/or foundation up until our times.

Architect Andrea Morpurgo has been assigned as project manager and put in charge of attracting funding. A dedicated website for the project has been developed with support from the secretary: https://www.cimiterovaldirose.org/ and contacts have been made with the wider community to organise fundraising activities.


A presentation on the initiative will be given by Architect Morpurgo at the International Convention on "Jewish Heritage in Slovenia", scheduled to take place in September 2019 at the Center for Jewish Art in Jerusalem.





FLORENCE SYNAGOGUE RESTORATION

The need for urgent restoration works to be carried out on the Florence Synagogue became apparent in 2017, following concerns over structural failures. The fundraising campaign, launched by Opera del Tempio di Firenze in collaboration with the Foundation, was very successful, drawing contributions from both private donors and Fondazione Cassa di Risparmio di Firenze and enabling works to begin quickly to secure the structure.

RESTORATION OF SILVER PIECES AT THE JEWISH MUSEUM OF VENICE

A generous donation enabled the Foundation to undertake the restoration of precious 18th- and 19th-century silver pieces (*rimmonim*, *ataroth*, *tzedakah* casings, book bindings) held at the Jewish Museum of Venice, thus restoring their primitive splendour.





ARCHIVES AND LIBRARIES

Thanks to a donation by the *Rothschild Foundation (Hanadiv) Europe*, a joint project was launched by UCEI, FBCEI and CDEC in 2017, to train qualified personnel to manage the Jewish Community libraries.

The Foundation Secretary acted as project manager for this important initiative.

In 2018, following a detailed progress review, it became clear that there was a need to catalogue Hebrew language texts, something that could not be achieved locally due to a lack of specialism in the field and financial resources.

In light of these newly identified needs, a funding application was submitted (and approved) by UCEI to RFHE – in collaboration with the National Central Library of Rome (BNCR) and the National Library of Israel (NLI) – to fund a pilot cataloguing project. This involved a photography campaign featuring 2000 books from across a number of sample libraries (Bibliographic Centre with volumes from Pitigliano and Florence, CDEC, Turin and Genoa). Remote exchange activities were also carried out via Google Drive with two cataloguers specialised in the field. Following NLI and Online Computer Library Centre (OCLC) database searches, they created excel files, which were scientifically verified by NLI and used to populate the database to create a digital Teca. The latter has been specifically modified to work with Hebrew characters, is hosted by BNCR and is available at: http://digitale.bnc.roma.sbn.it/tecadigitale/progettoVolumiEbraici

Subject to an assessment by the *Rothschild Foundation* on the results of the pilot project, the latter has committed to supporting a three-year programme, that would enable the ancient volumes held across all Jewish Communities and State Libraries to be catalogued. Given the practical experience gained, the Foundation would be called upon to perform a central role in implementing the project.

EXHIBITIONS AND EVENTS



EXHIBITION "E le acque si calmarono" [And the waters calmed] (to mark the return to Florence of books damaged during the 1966 flood) – 27 October 2016 – National Library of Florence

In Autumn 2016, to mark the 50th anniversary of the flood in Florence, the Foundation – in collaboration with the National Library of Florence, the local Jewish Community, UCEI and Opera del Tempio Ebraico, and with the support of Fondazione Cassa di Risparmio di Firenze and Fondazione Ambron e Castiglioni – supported and organised a major exhibition, featuring affected texts, belonging to the Florentine Community and the Library, that have since been restored.

The exhibition, entitled "E le acque si calmarono" [And the waters calmed] opened on 27 October 2016 at the National Library of Florence, following an international convention of Jewish publishing, focusing on Florentine publishing in particular.

Furthermore, on 30 October 2016, an exhibition took place at the Synagogue of Florence featuring Jewish documents from 1700 and 1800 discovered in Rome and returned to Florence, as

well as furnishings and Jewish artworks damaged by flood waters and later restored. An exhibition at Palazzo Medici Riccardi of artworks affected by the floods, meanwhile, featured a section dedicated to Jewish artefacts.







EXHIBITION "Tutti i colori dell'Italia Ebraica" [All the colours of Jewish Italy] – 26 June 2019 – Uffizi Gallery, Florence

In 2019, in collaboration with the Jewish Museum of Rome and the Foundation Uffizi Gallery, the organised major, fascinating а the exhibition at prestigious Florentine museum. Open to the public from 26 June to 27 October, it mainly features Italian Jewish textiles, including examples from abroad, as well as other objects and precious furnishings, such as the ancient Pisa Aron, restored for the occasion.

The show represents an extraordinary opportunity to introduce the Italian and international public to Italy's Jewish cultural treasures, and to the restoration and development works carried out by the Foundation.

EUROPEAN DAY OF JEWISH CULTURE

To mark the various editions of the "European Day of Jewish Culture" over the last three years, the Foundation has organised various activities:

2017 – return of two exhibitions from previous years, one curated by the Regional Cultural Heritage Department and the Palermo Authority, the other curated by the University of Palermo, to be displayed in the lead city for the year.

The Vice Chair Sacerdoti was invited to Agira to celebrate the occasion and to attend the presentation of the ancient Aron restoration project by the municipality.

2018 – launch of the <u>www.visitjewishitaly.it</u> website (see "websites" section).

ITALIAN AUSCHWITZ MEMORIAL

The Foundation was involved – thanks to Vice Chair Renzo Funaro's membership of the Scientific Committee – in the important project of bringing the *Memoriale in onore degli italiani assassinati nei campi nazisti* [Memorial in honour of Italians killed in the Nazi camps] exhibition to Florence. Originally set up in Auschwitz in 1979, and opened in Spring of the following year, management of the concentration camp museum unexpectedly closed this extremely powerful and interesting work to the public in 2011, threatening its disassembly and destruction in 2014.









RESEARCH GRANTS

Applications opened in 2017 for two research grants for projects focusing on Jewish cultural heritage in Italy. As well as facilitating conservation and development activities, these grants also seek to support research sessions and further study of the wealth of Jewish cultural artefacts in the country. This initiative is specifically targeted at young researchers.

- Jewish cultural heritage in Southern Italy

This grant was awarded to Giuseppe Campagna (supervised by prof. Nicolò Bucaria), for a research project on the Jewish presence in the urban fabric of Messina in the 14th and 15th centuries.

The project is currently awaiting publication by Casa Editrice Viella.

- Architectural works, furnishings, artefacts and Jewish cultural products in Italy from the Late Medieval period up until Italian Unification

The grant was awarded to Lucrezia Signorello (supervised by prof. Serena Di Nepi) for a research project on record 1H7 of the Jewish University of Rome archive, part of the "Giovanni Spizzichino" Historical Archive of the Jewish Community of Rome (ASCER).

The project, edited by FBCEI, is currently awaiting publication by Editore Pontecorboli.

- The Jewish catacombs of Venosa

The grant, offered in collaboration with Associazione Daniela di Castro, was awarded to Vito Muscio (supervised by prof. Giancarlo Laceranza) for the research, promotion and optimal use of the Jewish catacombs of Venosa.

Another research grant was made available in 2019, awarded to Ms Elena Lolli for a research project on "The records of a Jewish moneylender in Northern Italy between 1408 and 1410 (*ms. Oxford, Corpus Christi College Library, CCC 469*). An original manuscript in the economic history of the Jewish people in the early modern period".



DEVELOPMENT OF CULTURAL ASSETS

THE JEWISH CATACOMBS OF VENOSA

Various meetings were held with the Basilicata Archaeology, Fine Arts and Landscape Authority, and with local institutions, as part of the project intended to promote the archaeological site featuring the catacombs at Venosa, under the scientific direction of Prof. Giancarlo Lacerenza.

In collaboration with Associazione Daniela Di Castro, meanwhile, a research grant was awarded to



facilitate the research, promotion and optimal use of the Jewish catacomb heritage site at Venosa (see also "Research grants"). A section of the video produced on this initiative was shown on the RAI show "Sereno Variabile" as part of an episode on Basilicata that aired on 12 January 2019 (https://www.raiplay.it/social/video/2019/01/Sereno -Variabile-0ae89707-6bd3-41c4-a864-

It was also the subject of a research afternoon in Rome on 4 June 2019 at the "Tullia Zevi" Bibliographical Centre – "Valorizzazione e fruizione dei beni culturali ebraici in Italia. Un viaggio virtuale alla scoperta delle Catacombe Ebraiche di Venosa" [Promotion and use of Jewish cultural heritage in Italy. A virtual journey of discovery of the Jewish Catacombs of Venosa].

Links were established in 2018 with the "Le Terre di Aristeo" Rural Tourism District Association, which led, in early 2019, to an agreement being signed with *Amphora*, Scuola Mediterranea di Alta Formazione [Postgraduate Training Centre], *Il Melograno degli Angeli*, a Basilicata Region

accredited training body, the University of Basilicata and Naples Eastern University. This agreement involves a commitment to collaborate on a multi-year plan for the cultural development and tourist promotion of the Jewish cultural heritage sites at Venosa and in other areas of the Region. The first objective is pursued via a series of events, to be held in Venosa in 2020, on theme of "Jewish Venosa".

NAPLES - SPINACORONA CHURCH

An inspection was carried out, together with local community leaders, to assess the theory that the Spinacorona Church was originally a synagogue. The data is currently being analysed before being



made available to the Naples Community, to whom the Naples Curia would like to donate the building.

AGIRA - STONE ARON

Inspections and meetings have taken place, with participation by the Chair of UCEI, regarding promotion by the Municipality of Agira of a stone Aron.


PROMOTION OF THE ANCIENT SEFER TORAH OF BIELLA



Restoration was completed in 2016 of the Sefer Torah of Biella, carried out by sofer Amedeo Spagnoletto and returned to its Community in a solemn and emotional ceremony. Carbon-14 dating, performed by the University of Illinois, has determined that the Sefer, written in Ashkenazi script, dates back to 1250; this means it is probably the oldest Sefer of European origin in

Jewish Community and still readable. The importance of this work, representing a prime example of the restoration of an Italian Jewish

Community artefact in close collaboration with that community, was recognised at the 17th World Congress of Jewish Studies, which saw Rav Spagnoletto being invited to talk about it during the prestigious academic gathering at Mount Scopus Campus of the Hebrew *University* of Jerusalem in the summer of 2017.



The precious Sefer was then displayed, from April to September 2019, as part of the major exhibition "Il Rinascimento parla ebraico" [The Renaissance speaks Hebrew] at MEIS in Ferrara, alongside another of Italy's Jewish cultural treasures, the Aron haQodesh, and the 15th century Bimah from the ancient Synagogue of Modena, which is now part of the Musée d'Art et d'Histoire du Judaisme (MAHJ) collection in Paris.



2018 saw the launch of the new www.visitjewishitaly.it portal, providing information on the country's Jewish cultural heritage. It is the product of a major overhaul of the previous "Luoghi Imperdibili" [Unmissable sites] website, online since 2015. The new site features photographs and images and has undergone a complete visual and technological transformation; Italian Jewish cultural heritage artefacts are now presented with geo-references and multimedia functionality.



In November 2018, the Foundation presented its work as part of the *Incubator* project, participating in a preliminary meeting organised by AEPJ in Barcelona aimed at establishing a joint European body to develop the European Routes of Jewish Heritage, for which certification was sought from the European Council in January 2019. The Foundation's website project was selected, from among the many contributions to the *Incubator* initiative, to continue for the next two years.

As well as this future prestigious collaboration at a European level, the Foundation is also currently implementing the www.visitjewishitaly.it website, working to incorporate areas not included in the first phase, and develop thematic and regional routes.

SERVICES FOR JEWISH COMMUNITIES AND CULTURAL INSTITUTIONS

As always, particular focus has been placed on providing effective support and consultancy services to the Communities as regards their heritage conservation, restoration and promotional needs, helping them access various sources of public and private, national, European and international, funding to achieve the relevant objectives.

MIBAC TABLE AND FIVE PER THOUSAND

One of the main sources of financing for FBCEI is the three-yearly MIBAC table, valid from 2018 to 2020.

As regards registering with the Revenue Agency for the Five Per Thousand scheme, renewal is automatic.

EQUITY, CURRENT ACCOUNTS AND INVESTMENTS

The decision was made at the end of 2018 to open a new current account with Banca Prossima, part of the Intesa Sanpaolo group, which offers better incentives for non-profits.

At present then, the following current accounts are in use:

- IT37T0200805205000400417262 (Unicredit): for associated bond maturity purposes. Once
 investments are liquidated and redirection of transfers to the new account has been verified,
 the latter current account will be closed.



LEGAL COMPLIANCE

- In 2018, Italy implemented privacy laws to comply with the general European data protection regulation, officially regulation no. 2016/679 but better known as the GDPR.
- In 2019, the Third Sector reform was introduced, which will give non-profits a new regulatory status.
- In both cases, a lawyer was engaged to support FBCEI with its compliance obligations.
- As regard electronic invoicing requirements, introduced on 1 January 2019, FBCEI, as a non-profit, is subject to the obligation to receive invoices in electronic format to its certified e-mail account fondazionebcei@pec.it

PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT - SECRETARY

In 2018, for the purposes of extending the office opening hours with a view to benefiting the organisation, the Council decided to appoint Ms Diletta Cesana, who has been collaborating with the organisation for over 10 years, as Secretary.

Diletta Cesana was hired under a part-time, open-ended employment contract (16 hours per week) as of 1/01/2019, classified under the 3rd level of the Italian National Collective Bargaining Agreement for the tertiary sector, with secretarial, accounting and administrative duties.

She works from the "Tullia Zevi" Bibliographical Centre, Lungotevere Sanzio 5, Rome, in an office kindly made available by the Union of Italian Jewish Communities.

At the same time, Ms Cesana entered into an identical employment relationship, under the same conditions, with the CDEC Foundation. Her work hours, divided equally between the two organisations, are:

- Monday to Thursday: 9.00 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. (half-hour lunch break)
- Friday: 9.00 a.m. to 1 p.m.
